COLLECTIONS & EXHIBITIONS

- Between July 2020 and March 2021, the Collections department researched, presented, and processed 181 objects as additions to the permanent collection. Several of these new treasures have already debuted in the Museum's galleries.
- 461 items were added to the Museum's public online database bringing the total from 3,685 to 4,148, including 309 new acquisitions and 152 objects already in the collection.
- From July 2020 through May 2021, department staff members researched, organized, designed, and installed 10 exhibitions. Nine of these exhibitions were based on new and original research by Museum staff. Numerous outdoor interpretive signs on the grounds were also updated.
- The Museum loaned pieces from its collection to four exhibitions:

SPONSORSHIPS & GRANTS


- The Museum received the following sponsorships, grants and community support of the 2020-21 fiscal year:

VISITORSHIP & PROGRAMS

VISITORS:

 As of April 30, The Columbus Museum recorded 7,878 visitors. This number has been impacted by reduced hours of operation as well as reduced building capacity.

PROGRAMS:

This year, the education department continued to create virtual programs and resources for Museum audiences in addition to relaunching limited in-person programs in late 2020.

- In summer 2020, a new series of virtual programs for families was launchedcovering topics such as at-home art-making activities, artist talks and features, and a virtual adaptation of our canceled Gallery Scenes program
- School programs continued in a virtual format:
 - The Museum's virtual school tour program served almost 800 students and teachers this year, throughout the local area and around the country.
 - Museum PALS (Pre-K Art & Literacy in Schools) expanded to 16 classes in six different MCSD schools this year, reaching 312 students and teachers each month.
- Virtual artist talks and lectures covered a range of topics and presented the opportunity to partner with speakers who would not have been able to attend in-person programs.
- In place of the Museum's popular family festivals, the Education team created hybrid virtual events combined with take-home activity kits.
 - 716 people engaged with the virtual Fall Festival
 - 150 people engaged with the virtual February Festival
- Mini Makers, the Museum's gallery program for children aged 2-5 years and their caregivers, was also adapted to this format, serving 99 children over the course of the year.
- The Education department partnered with the Development department to distribute 200 activity bags to individuals and community partners.

SPECIAL EVENTS

The COVID-19 pandemic halted traditional special events at the Museum. The team did creatively present the following events with safety of guests and staff in mind:

FARM TO TABLE(AUX):

Cancelled in the spring due to the pandemic, the fall Farm to Table(aux) virtual fundraiser was led by co-chairs Kathelen Amos and Eliza Brewer in a hybrid format. The event included a drive-thru meet and greet with Celebrity Chef Alex Hitz, who prepared a boxed dinner to go. After the drive-thru, the Museum broadcast a program to update our guests on Museum education programs, events, and exhibitions and to show them appreciation for helping us achieve our goals during a very challenging year.

MASTER CIRCLE 2020:

The Columbus Museum hosted our annual Master's Circle gathering in early December. Rather than the traditional dinner, guests were invited to sit outside under beautiful lights provided by RSL Theatrical Lighting and enjoy The Columbus Ballet perform "Waltz of the Snowflake' from *The Nutcracker*. Master Circle Members received a gift bag with wine from our wine sponsors, Georgia Crown, and light snacks. Gift bags were delivered to members who were unable to attend.

ALMA THOMAS SOCIETY 2021:

■ On February 2, The Alma Thomas Society voted and chose this year's winning piece of art, Therman Statom's glass assemblage sculpture Cuatro Historias Sobre La Luz, 2020. The event included voters attending in person and on Zoom. Attendees received a gift bag that included Alma Thomas-themed notecards, magnets and a face mask. It also included two books from former and current exhibits focused on African American history and art.

2021 ANNUAL FUNDRAISER - FABRIC OF OUR COMMUNITY:

■ On April 22, the Museum held the spring fundraiser, *F*abric of our Community, themed around our current third floor show, Paolo Arao: In Dialogue with Drawing as well as the Chattahoochee Valley's rich legacy in the textile industry. Patron Sponsors received gift bags tied with Larkin Lane fabric as well as access to videos produced by the Museum's Public Relations & Marketing team that featured a welcome and appreciation message from Director Marianne Richter; an exclusive tour of the Paolo Arao exhibition with Curator of American Art Jonathan Frederick Walz, Ph.D.; and a history talk with Curator of History Rebecca Bush. Upon arrival, guests were greeted by stilt walkers from The Springer Theater Academy and enjoyed beautifully packaged charcuterie boxes, Paolo Arao-inspired cookies, and wine donated by Georgia Crown. All Patrons were entered into a raffle for two beautiful pieces of art by Arao and a two-night stay at Hotel Indigo with dinner included.

THE VIRTUAL MUSEUM

The Museum continued to maintain the Virtual Museum through online talks, tours and programs, adding content to educator resources, the Virtual Museum for Kids, as well as programming for adults. Since July 1, 2020:

- Visits to the Virtual Museum landing page have increased by 96 percent
- Visits to columbusmuseum.com have increased by 17 percent
- The number of visitors to the Museum's website has increased by 45 percent
- Social media engagement continued to increase

VOLUNTEERS

The Museum utilized 131 volunteers this fiscal year in programs and events, totaling 1,132 hours of service.

The Museum's volunteer department continued its membership with the nonprofit Tri-Community Directors of Volunteer Services to better engage with other nonprofits in the community

COLUMBUS MUSEUM SHOP

- The Shop revenue was \$26,493.43 for shop sales as of April 30, 2021
- The Shop welcomed four new consignors: Saturday Expressions, Amanda Weldon Art, Spa Day Holiday, and Sherry Glass' wreaths and driftwood pieces
- The Shop hosted the Holiday Market Open House virtually this year. The Outdoor Spring Market was a socially distanced Open House that was held in-per-
- The Shop hosted the Glass Maker's Workshop in the fall, featuring glass pumpkins, and in the spring, featuring glass flowers
- The Shop continued its memberships with the MidTown Business Association and the Museum Store Association
